
BUILD A LEGACY FOR OUTDOOR ADVENTURE

Towering at 3,954 meters (12,972 feet), Yexyexéscen (Mount Robson) is the highest peak in the Canadian Rockies, a powerful symbol of natural beauty, resilience, and cultural significance. Known as "The Mountain of the Spiral Road" to the Secwépemc, this mountain has been revered by Indigenous Peoples for generations as a sacred place, deeply woven into their histories, traditions, and way of life. Long before it became a sought-after destination for alpinists and outdoor enthusiasts drawn to its rugged terrain, pristine wilderness, and iconic summit, it held profound spiritual and cultural meaning for those who have called this land home.

The Alpine Club of Canada's new hut at Mount Robson Provincial Park will serve as a gateway to this remarkable backcountry experience. Affordable, accessible, and comfortable, the hut will provide a welcoming space for visitors to prepare a hot meal and share stories with new and old friends.





ACC'S ROOTS INEXTRICABLY TIED TO YEXYEXÉSCEN

In 1913, William 'Billy' Foster, Albert 'Mack' MacCarthy, and legendary mountain guide Conrad Kain made the first recorded ascent of Mount Robson from an Alpine Club of Canada camp in Robson Pass, very near the building site of the new ACC hut.






Their daring 17-hour climb - which required the cutting of over 600 steps in the snow and ice of the mountain's Kain Face - epitomized teamwork, determination, and respect for the alpine environment; values that continue to define the ACC today.

The GMC at Mount Robson

Mount Robson has been a key venue for ACC's General Mountaineering Camps through the years, consistently challenging climbers and strengthening our community. In 1924, the camp was located at the northwest end of Kinney Lake and the mountain saw four ascents that year from a high camp on the south side, all guided by Conrad Kain. Three subsequent GMCs were held at Berg Lake in 1955, 1974, and the 75th anniversary camp in 1988.







A VISION YEARS IN THE MAKING

Planning for this hut began in 2006 as an Alpine Club Centennial project and was revived in 2012. After a pause in 2022 due to flood damage and the pandemic, the project is back on track!

We are excited to move forward and bring this long-awaited vision to life.

ABOUT THE HUT

The new hut will be a safe, warm shelter in the remote wilderness of Mount Robson Park, welcoming adventurers in all seasons.

Facilities

- + Bunks for up to 12 people
- + Propane heating and cooking
- + Electric lighting, ventilation and device charging powered by renewable solar energy

Access

- + 24 km hike from Mount Robson Information Centre via well-maintained trails with several campgrounds en route. You can bike as far as Kinney Lake Campground (13.4 km).
- + Optional helicopter access in both summer and winter

Recreation

- + A base for climbers attempting Mt. Robson and other peaks in the area
- + Proximity to world-renowned backcountry trails, including:
 - Berg Lake Trail
 - Kinney Lake
 - Moose Pass
 - Snowbird Pass
- + Exceptional backcountry ski terrain at:
 - Mumm Peak
 - Hargreaves Lake
 - Toboggan Falls
 - Robson Pass

Project Cost & Campaign Goal: \$1.2 Million

The Spiral Road Campaign aims to raise a total of \$1.2 million to fund the design, construction, and completion of this essential facility. This comprehensive goal covers not only the direct building costs but also the necessary expenses for project logistics, contingencies, and community engagement. Thanks to the generosity of our first supporters, over \$400,000 has already been committed. These early contributions signal strong momentum and a shared belief in the vision for the Byron Caldwell Hut.

How the funds Will Be Allocated:



Design, materials, and construction: \$1,065,000 to cover all phases of the hut's construction, including site preparation, materials, transportation, and installation.




Legacy and acknowledgements: \$25,000 to support Indigenous consultations, community engagement, and the creation of meaningful donor recognition opportunities.



STORIES OF LEGACY HUT NAMED IN BYRON CALDWELL'S MEMORY







During the ACC's General Mountaineering Camp in 1988, Byron Caldwell, Scott Sarjeant, and their party, guided by Don Vockeroth, summited Mount Robson.

Byron and Scott's climb marked a lifelong bond between the two climbers, forged through their shared passion for adventure. Mount Robson became a place of profound meaning for both men, representing resilience, courage, and the unyielding spirit of exploration.

Byron Caldwell tragically fell to his death while climbing in July 2018, a loss that deeply impacted those who knew and loved him.

In his will, Byron expressed a desire to leave a lasting legacy at Mount Robson.

Honouring his wishes, his wife, Mary Caldwell, made a leadership gift to establish the Byron Caldwell Hut at Mount Robson.

This hut will provide a safe and comfortable base for future climbers and skiers in the area while celebrating the adventurous spirit that Byron embodied.

Mary's generosity, alongside the contributions from the Sarjeant family and other friends of Byron, ensure that the Mount Robson area will continue to inspire generations of climbers and adventurers. Their gifts honour not only Byron's memory but also his enduring connection to Mount Robson and the community of adventurers who revere it.

Climbing Mount Robson was one of the most challenging yet rewarding experiences of my life. The technical terrain and sheer beauty of the mountain made it unforgettable, and having Byron by my side made it even more special. Mount Robson will always hold a unique place in my heart.

STORIES OF LEGACY

FAMILY'S LOVE FOR MOUNT ROBSON

Margaret Gmoser grew up close to the mountains - and she's never left them.

Her father was a member of The Alpine Club of Canada in Calgary, AB, and over the years, she's camped and backpacked her way around the world.

Her late husband Hans ran ski touring camps and guided at many General Mountaineering Camps for the ACC, including the Yukon Alpine Centennial Expedition in 1967. In 1986 Hans was made an honourary member of the club, and in 2003 he was the Patron of the club's Mountain Guides Ball along with the other founders of the Association of Canadian Mountain Guides.

Margaret and Hans' love of the mountains was passed on to their two sons, Conrad and Robson, the latter named for Mount Robson, which Hans was climbing near the time of his birth. Robson became a passionate ski guide, deeply connected to the wilderness, but was tragically killed in an avalanche near Glacier National Park at the age of 45.

To honour Robson's memory and their family's deep connection to the outdoors, Margaret, Conrad, and Robson's wife, Olivia, have contributed to the construction of the Byron Caldwell Hut, a project that will provide climbers and adventurers with a safe and welcoming space on the mountain.


I like that it is designed for families. We need to get the younger generation into the outdoors. The area is one of the most beautiful places I know.
